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

Ol About

Established in 1996, National Tree
Day has grown into Australia's largest
community tree planting and nature care
event. The program is a call to action for
all Australians to get their hands dirty and
give back to their community.

Each year, around 300,000 people volunteer their time to engage in environmental activities that educate Australians about the world around them.

More than 3000 preschools, kindergartens, primary and high school students participate nationwide each year. Activities range from planting bush tucker gardens to building habitat for native wildlife, nature play and more.

It's a day to venture outdoors, get to know your community and, most importantly, have fun!

Over **28 million trees, shrubs and grasses** have been planted by more than **5 million people**, and this number continues to grow with the help of dedicated volunteers around the country.

While every or any day can be Tree Day, Schools Tree Day and National Tree Day are held on the last Friday and Sunday of July, respectively. Our community up in the Northern part of Australia celebrate Tropical Tree Day on the first Sunday in December, each year.

National Tree Day is an opportunity to recognise the hard work of communities around Australia and celebrate their ongoing commitment to the environment.

Volunteer

Become a National Tree Day volunteer at a public site to join others in restoration and regeneration. See the steps on the next page about how to get started as a volunteer.

Become a Site Coordinator

Become a site coordinator to run your own Tree Day site. The site coordinator will be responsible for organising and hosting the Tree Day site/event.

Note: When registering your Tree Day site you can choose to run a private or public site

Steps for Volunteers





You can find a site near you by entering your postcode on the **National Tree Day website**.


Note: If there are no sites listed in suburbs near you check the website regularly to see if any new sites are listed.

Step 2





Fill out a volunteer form for the site you are planning on attending, so that site coordinators know you will be there and can keep track of numbers.



Getting started

As a site coordinator

Steps for Site Coordinators



Step 1

Choose a date



Schools Tree Day and National Tree Day are held on the last Friday and Sunday of July, respectively. If this is not an ideal time to plant in your area, Tree Day activities can take place on any date – remember to register with Planet Ark.

Step 2



Find a site

You need to determine who owns your site. If that's not you, seek permission from the local council or private landholder to plant there.

You don't have to be planting trees to get involved with National Tree Day – we encourage groups who are working on bush regeneration, coastal and dune care and any other nature preservation activity to register for National Tree Day.

Step 3



Register your event

Go to the **National Tree Day website** to register:

- Estimated number of volunteers
- Estimated number of plants
- Event details

You can register as a public site or private site. If you register as a public site the event will be visible on the Tree Day website.

Please note: registration is necessary to receive support materials for your Tree Day activity and for your volunteers to be insured.

Step 4

Promote your event



- Advertise your event in the local community
- Consider creating a Facebook event to track the amount of attendees and help manage expected numbers
- Contact your community newspaper, reach out to your local council and inform local residents about your event.

Step 5

Prepare for the day



Use the Coordinator's Toolkit and event planner to prepare for the day. Send a reminder to your volunteers about what they need to bring, such as suitable clothing, gloves, sturdy footwear, sunscreen, hats, equipment, drinks and snacks, hand sanitiser.

Please note: Working with Children procedures must be implemented and adhered to.

Step 6

Report your results



Make your effort count and report your results to the Tree Day support team in our coordinator hub.

Planting Resources

Ask your local community to get involved

Your local council or community nursery may be able to help by supplying native seedlings or plants. Some may even be able to provide buckets and shovels for the day or help with site preparation and maintenance. Get in touch with your local council or support group as early as possible. Check with your local Toyota dealership to see if they are available to collaborate for your Tree Day activity.

Planet Ark recommends that you plant local natives. Local natives are perfectly suited to the local soil type and climate, and they're also great for wildlife. To find plants native to your local area call your council


